

Repair Shop Survey Shows Importance of Right to Repair Reforms

As lawmakers consider Right to Repair reforms across the country, we have reached out to US repair shops to get a sense of what impact these reforms will have, and what local repair shops think about Right to Repair. A total of 253 repair shops answered our survey, circulated by US PIRG and iFixit.

Q1. What type of devices do you fix? Select all that apply.

Consumer devices (smartphones, laptops & tablets)	241	95%
Video game consoles	100	40%
Enterprise or IT equipment	101	40%
Home appliances	42	17%

In addition there were 19 "Other" responses: "TVs, drones, cameras and vintage electronics", "Just about anything with a circuit board we repair", "Electronics test equipment", "Data recovery from hard drives, flash devices, and SSDs", "cars/motors/compressors", "anything electric and cars", "commercial equipment", "Stereo gear", "Anything mechanical", "If it is broken, I try to fix it!!", "Pianos", "Oreck Vacuum Cleaners", "Apple products only", "Commercial audio, video, and control devices", and "Small town - whatever folks bring in, really."




Q4. How often do you have to turn away potential customers because of restricted access to repair parts, materials, software or information?
